# OUTLINE OF STATE OF MICHIGAN HEALTH PROGRAMS

## Introduction

This outline is designed to be a ready reference to health programs and spending by the state of Michigan.

### Health Programs Defined

Health programs defined in this outline are those that have the primary purpose of: promoting the public health; preventing health problems; maintaining and improving personal health; identifying threats to health; and, treating physical and mental disease. There are four principal ways in which the state addresses these goals:

1. *Direct Provision.* The state employs persons and runs facilities such as state mental hospitals, laboratories and prison infirmaries that provide direct health services
2. *Purchase.* The state purchases health services from a broad range of individuals and organizations through programs like Medicaid and state employee health insurance. Grants are included in this category since the state is most often providing funds with the expectation that the work conducted will result in findings and service deliveries that assist in future policy making and allocation decisions for the purchase of services. General support funds for community mental health programs, local health departments, substance abuse agencies and area agencies on aging are included here since the state is purchasing the services they provide through the provision of these funds.
3. *Subsidization.* Michigan provides funds to organizations and individuals to provide general assistance in carrying out health related functions the state wishes to financially support. Examples include support of medical schools at public universities, and monies provided to support certain non-profit agencies.
4. *Regulation.* The state regulates health providers through licensing and certification, authorizes certain capital expenditures by health agencies and licenses persons who practice medicine and provide other health services. It licenses health insurers and health maintenance organizations.

### Health Spending Defined

Amounts shown in this outline are based upon appropriations for the fiscal year 2000-2001 (October 2000 through September 2001). This differs from actual expenditure amounts because not all funds may be spent within the given fiscal year and/or supplemental appropriations and transfers between or among items may alter the amounts originally authorized within any given year.

Appropriation amounts are the timeliest indicator of the financial commitment to health by the state, however, because they are almost always determined prior to the beginning of a fiscal year. Actual expenditure data are not usually available until six months after the close of the fiscal year.

The outline is based on the line item titles used in appropriations acts for the departments of state government. Some cover a broad range of programs and others are quite specific. Narratives for each topic reflect this.

## Sources of Funds

All funds expended by the State of Michigan are to be authorized through appropriations acts which include funds from a number of sources including the Federal Government, Constitutionally dedicated tax revenues, fees, locally collected revenues and a variety of other sources (See **Appendix A**). The outline shows both the expenditure amount authorized and the source(s) of revenue(s) from which the expenditures are to be made. If amounts available from the source(s) are less than included in the appropriation act, spending is to be reduced accordingly. If amounts are greater, a supplemental appropriation can be granted by another appropriations act.

## State/State and Local/Local

Programs directly provided by the state or which are purchased, regulated or subsidized without local fiduciary responsibility are defined as State programs. State and Local designations include areas where state and local units of government (including school districts) share fiduciary responsibilities. Local programs are those where local units receive funds from the state and are fully responsible for both administrative and fiduciary functions.

## Administrative Costs

Every department of Michigan government is authorized funds for the costs of administering its various programs. Often referred to as “Management and General”, these amounts pay for such functions as executive direction, finance and budget, information technology, and, human resources. These are not included in the outline. Administrative costs directly associated with a program, such as staffing, are included here.

## EPIDEMIOLOGY

<b>DESCRIPTION:</b>	Epidemiology is concerned with the gathering and analyzing of scientific information used to develop and direct public health policies for disease detection and prevention. It is also concerned with the areas of chronic disease, injuries, and maternal and child health. Physicians are required to report persons with communicable diseases that may represent a threat to community health. As clusters of illness are determined, epidemiological studies are conducted to identify and confirm the cause of the disease. A Michigan Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System is maintained. Analysis and technical evaluations of environmental conditions which may threaten health through exposure to toxic substances are conducted and recommendations are made and actions taken where problems are identified.

## GRAND RAPIDS AND D.J. JACOBETTI HOMES FOR VETERANS

**YEAR ESTABLISHED/INITIATED:** 1885

**LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY:** M.C.L. Chapter 36, 16.229 and 36.71; 1885 PA 152, 380 PA 1965 and E.R.O. 1991-7

**DESCRIPTION:** Michigan operates two homes for veterans. One is located in Grand Rapids and the other in Marquette. First established to care for veterans of the Civil War, they serve wartime veterans and, on a space available basis, spouses and parents. Domiciliary care (assisted living) and nursing care includes physician, nursing, pharmacy, social work, nutrition and related services. There are two units for persons with Alzheimer's disease at Grand Rapids and one at Marquette. Eligible persons not able to meet the full charges for care are assessed an amount based on their ability to pay. A seven member Board of Managers governs the homes.

**DESCRIPTION:** Services provided by the Divisions of Infectious Diseases and Chemistry and Toxicology of the State Health Laboratory include identification and monitoring of infectious disease agents, the tracking of “new” or unusual disease agents, and the development and evaluation of new methods for detecting them. The laboratory performs tests for elevated lead levels. It also tests for any of seven genetic and metabolic diseases in newborns.

## COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES PROGRAMS

**LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY:** M.C.L. 330.1200 et seq.; M.C.L. 330.1300 et seq.; Parts 2 & 3 of the Michigan Mental Health Code 1974 PA 258.

**DESCRIPTION:** Chapter 2 of the Mental Health Code sets forth the nature and requirements of community mental health programs and Chapter 3 defines the financial responsibilities of the state and the counties for these services. Community Mental Health Service Programs (CMHSP) are provided under one of three arrangements:

- 1) a county community mental health agency which is an agency of the county;
- 2) a community mental health organization which is a separate government entity created by two or more counties under the Urban Cooperation Act; and,
- 3) an independent community mental health authority created through an enabling resolution adopted by the board of one or more counties.

There are currently 49 community mental health agencies operating under one of these arrangements covering all 83 Michigan counties.

Local Boards and Authorities must provide the mental health services and services for the developmentally disabled appropriate to the conditions of individuals located in their geographic area.

In general, counties are financially responsible for 10% of the net costs for persons within their jurisdiction with net being defined as costs less those amounts paid by Federal, private and/or insurance funds. (Local amounts are not included here.)

## COMMUNITY SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION, EDUCATION AND TREATMENT GRANTS

**LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY:** M.C.L. 333.6201 et seq.; 1978 PA 368, Part 62

**DESCRIPTION:** Federal regulations for the Federal Substance Abuse Block Grant require that: not less than 35% of the funds be used for prevention and treatment of alcohol abuse; not less than 35% be used for other drugs; and, not less than 20% be used for person who do not require treatment in providing education and counseling. Services are chiefly provided through local Substance Abuse Coordinating Agencies with some direct state contracts for unique services.

## LOCAL HEALTH DEPARTMENT OPERATIONS

**LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY:** M.C.L. 333.2401-2498; 1978 PA 368, Part 24

**DESCRIPTION:** The Public Health Code, Act 368 of 1978 provides for a system of local public health departments on a county or multi-county basis. It also permits the City of Detroit to operate a health department. Law charges them with responsibility to prevent disease, prolong life, and promote the public health. Minimum specific functions required are: immunization; infectious disease control; sexually transmitted disease control; hearing and vision screening for children, food protection, drinking water monitoring of both public and private systems; and, on-site sewage management.

## Michigan Health Funding Patterns

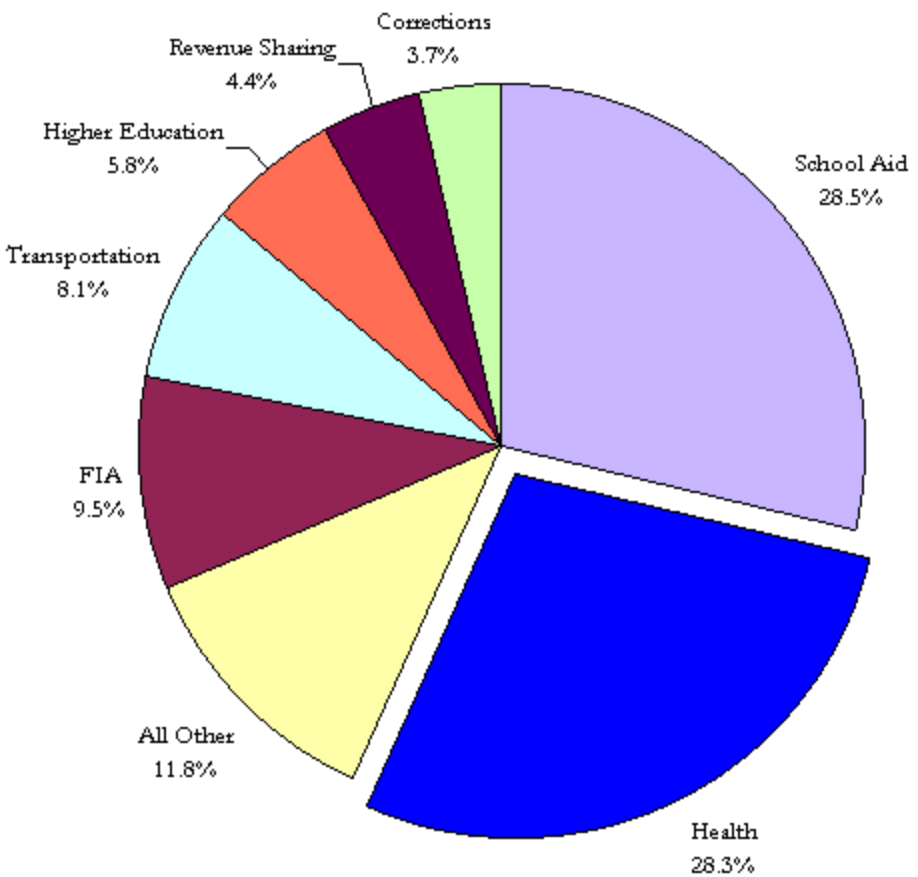
The outline shows the sources of funding for health programs according to the eight major categories used in appropriations acts and for state accounting purposes. These are:

1. General Fund/General Purpose. State revenues are deposited in the General Fund of the state of Michigan and are categorized as general purpose or special purpose (also called restricted). Revenues which are not specified to be used for specific purposes according to law are known as general-purpose funds.
2. General Fund/Special Purpose. State revenues that are restricted by law to be used for certain purposes are designated as special purpose or restricted funds. Examples include Healthy Michigan (certain revenues raised from the taxing of cigarette and tobacco products) and Michigan Health Initiative monies (funds raised from the taxing of computer software retail sales).
3. Federal. Funds received from the Federal Government.
4. Local. Funds received from local governmental units including school districts.
5. Private. Monies received by the state from private sources including foundations.
6. Interdepartmental Grant. Funds originally appropriated to one department are sometimes used to obtain services from another. An example is the Department of Corrections that gains forensic mental health services from the Department of Community Health.
7. Purchase of Service. Other units of government or organizations purchase some state services.
8. Special Revenue. Certain revenues such as those for the School Aid Fund are not placed in the General Fund of the State, but are maintained in separate accounts to be used only for specified purposes.

The following tables and charts show how these funding sources are used for health programs in general and how they are used to support for the four approaches the state used to address health matters.

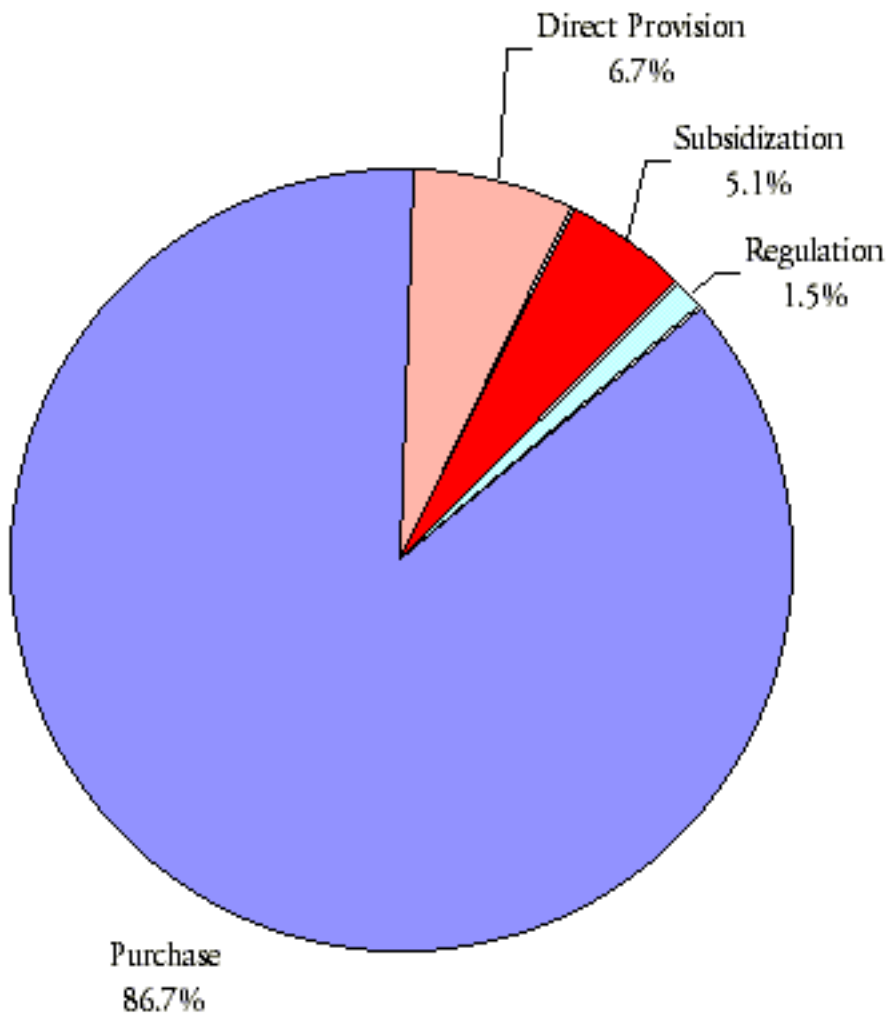

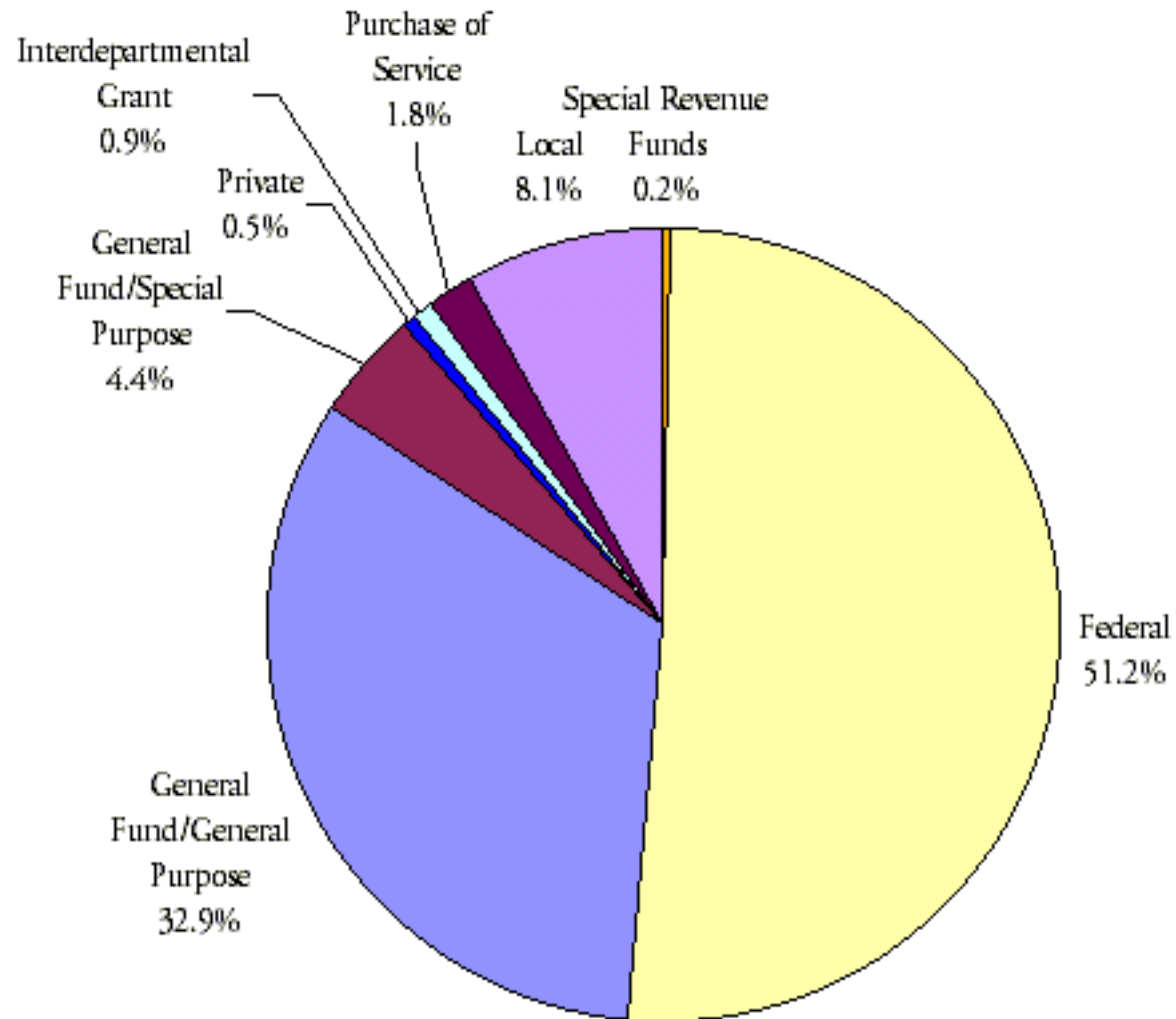

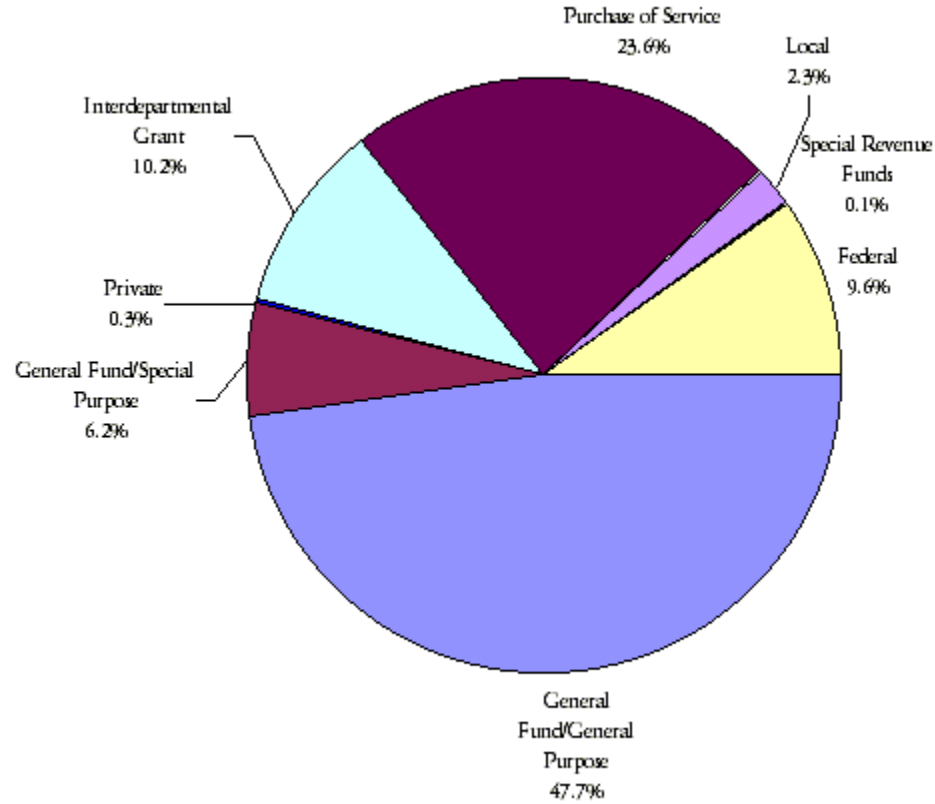
### Michigan Health Programs Funding Summary by Source of Funds

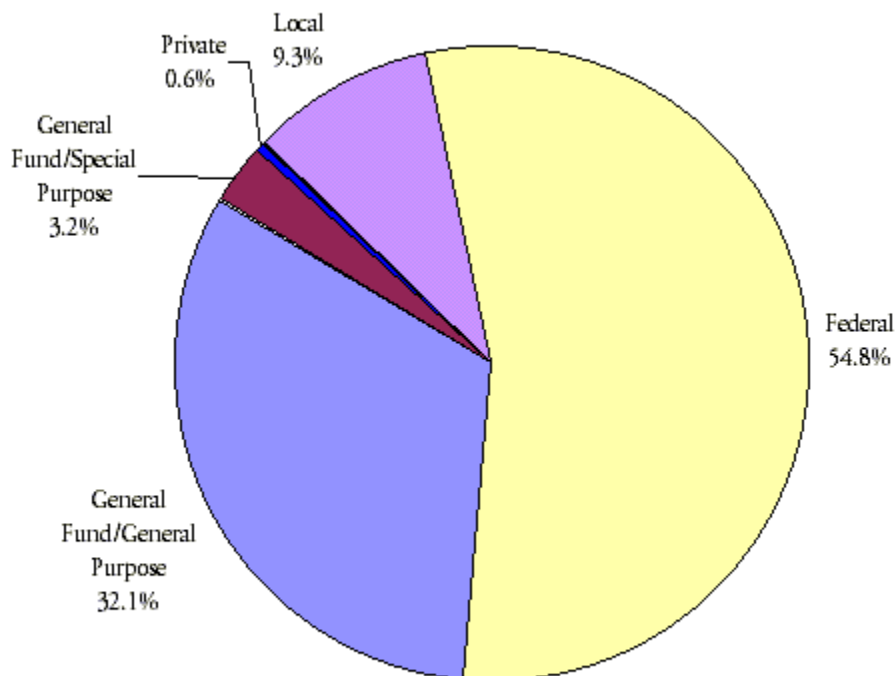

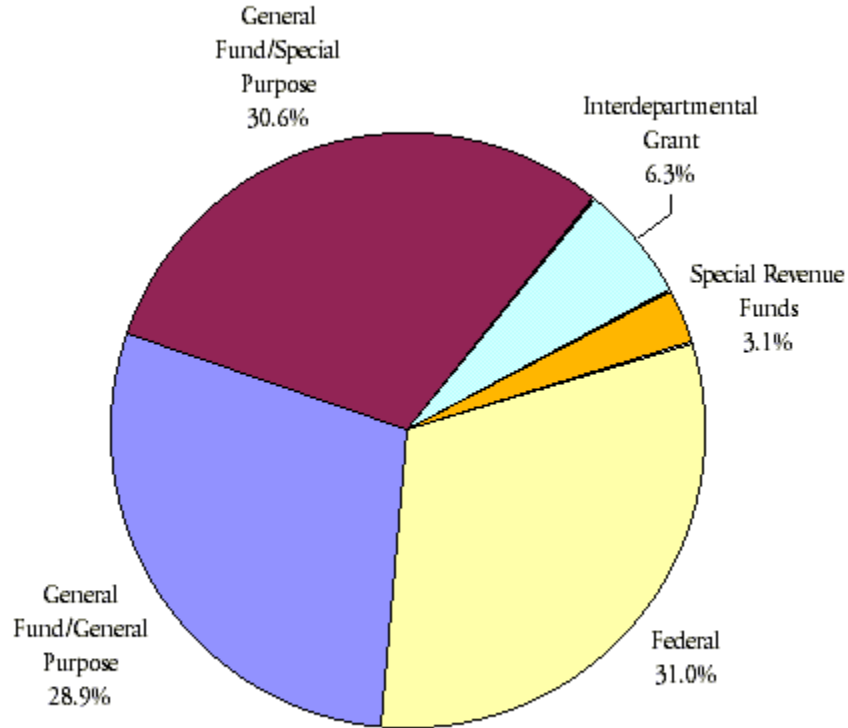

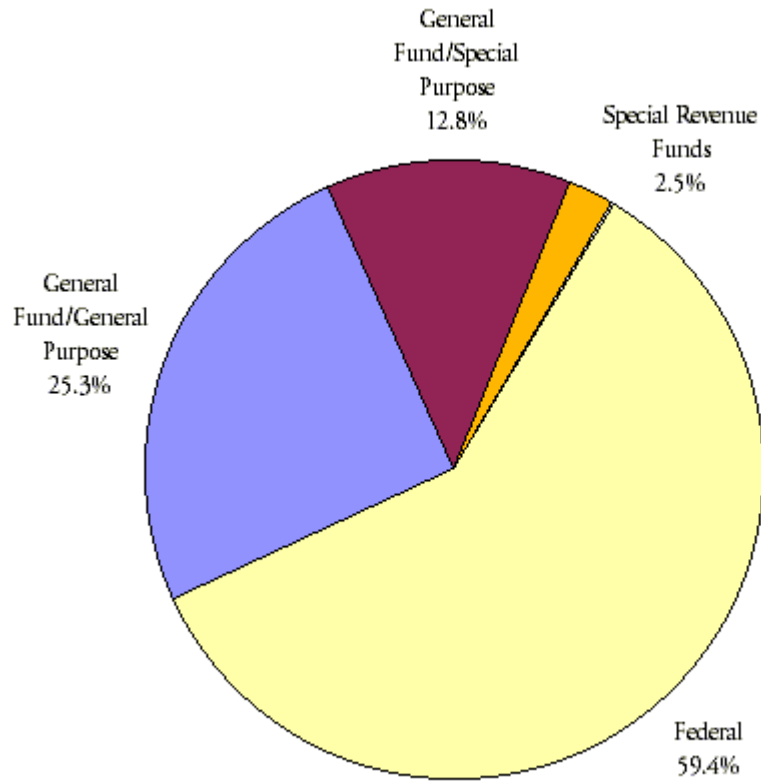
